SKCC Elmer Frequency

Attention all SKCC members. The SKCC projects team has declared that 7114 KHz is now the SKCC Elmer Frequency. We challenge our Elmers or any member that wants to help, to monitor that frequency whenever they can.

New CW operators need a safe haven where they can get on the air and not have to worry about making mistakes. Maybe for that first CW contact without the stress or fear of worrying about fouling up. The goal is to take away that fear, because WE DON'T CARE IF YOU MESS UP!

New: Novice Day - every Friday 0000z to 2400z is now Novice Day on 7114 KHz. No contest, just a day set aside for the beginners, the slower ops or anyone that wants to help. The goal is to congregate our beginners and they can help each other. Also to increase activity on 40 meters above 7100 KHz.

New: SKCC QRS Frequencies. A few weeks ago, we allocated that 2KHz up from each SKCC calling frequency was to be for high speed bug operators to congregate. We now declare that 2 KHz below each calling frequency will be QRS for our slower operators to congregate. Please note: The QRS frequencies are only suggested, the same as the bug frequencies are.

SKCC/FISTS Lookup

Many of our members are also members of other clubs, some of which also exchange membership numbers. FISTS is one such club. Getting both club membership numbers is easy if you know the operator is also a FISTS member. That is where Rob Thompson, G4LMW, comes in. Rob is a member of both SKCC and FISTS and has created a lookup utility to help

identify dual club members. The utility is very simple and supports query by callsign, FISTS number or SKCC number. Rob maintains the database so the results are accurate.

The lookup utility is an Active Server Page (ASP) which runs from Rob's web site. This means it is not available as a standalone utility and must be run from his web site, http://www.g4lmw.co.uk/links.html.

If you are an SKCC member with FISTS membership, give Rob's utility a try. If you do try Rob's lookup utility, please send us your feedback. We will share it with the club.

Editor's Soapbox

The WARC bands are a safe haven for operate during contests because these bands, 12 MHz, 18 MHz, and 30 MHz, are designed to be contest free. Over the last few months, I've heard SKCC sprint activity on 30 meters. Sprints are viewed as contests and therefore prohibited by agreement between IARU member nations, of which the United States is a member.

The SKS and WES rules state operations on 10, 15, 20, 40, 80, and 160 meters only. So lets please be careful during SKCC Sprints and other contest like events that we are not the group to cause an incident on the WARC bands.

While I am on the subject of operating procedures. Does QRL mean anything to anyone? It means; QRL? - Is the frequency in use?, QRL - The frequency is in use. I've heard several instances while putting together this issue of The SKCC Centurion where members start sending CQ SKCC without first sending QRL first. This is getting more common as time goes on.

Without sending QRL? how do you know if the frequency is in use an you just cannot hear the other station? Answer, you

don't. The bands are fickle these days and sometimes only one side of a QSO can be heard. Additionally, there are more and more members becoming active in QRP operations, which at times makes it difficult to hear both sides of the QSO.

What is the procedure for checking whether the frequency is busy? Send QRL? and LISTEN. If you hear nothing, send QRL? again and LISTEN. Hearing no responses, the frequency MAY be clear for you to use. Listening is the key. Sending QRL? seconds apart is not listening.

What responses can you get from sending QRL? You may hear nothing meaning the frequency MAY be clear. You may hear GA which means Go Ahead, usually this operator has been monitoring the frequency and knows it is clear. If You could hear C or Y indicating the frequency is in use. If you receive any response indicating the frequency is in use, DO NOT SEND ANYTING ELSE, simply wait or move on.

Some times a station sends C or Y and the station sending QRL? does not hear the response. In this case, if you hear it, it is acceptable for you to send C or Y, but that is all.

What do I do if someone starts a QSO on top of me? You have a few options, keep working because they obviously cannot hear you or don't care. Try to let them know you are in QSO and ask them to QSY. Finally, you may need to be the one to QSY, which I find to be the best solution.

I finish the bases in Minwax Wipe On Poly Gloss which gives a great shine but doesn't make the wood look like its covered in plastic." Samples of the bases are on the SKCC YAHOO group under "photos" and then to the N2JNZ Keys Folder. These are made from exotic woods and some are almost too pretty to drill holes into for mounting your key. Contact George gosier@twcny.rr.com for a list of exotic woods currently available.
